809485 Signalman THOMAS **QUEEN**, Prisoner of War (formerly No. 18 Technical Maintenance Section, 3rd Indian Corps Signals).

- Captured during the Malayan Campaign/Battle of Singapore. **Died as a prisoner of war** of malaria on 29 April 1942 at Changi, Singapore.
- Originally buried in the camp cemetery at Changi, his remains were reinterred on 20 April 1946 at Kranji War Cemetery, Singapore. *BELOVED HUSBAND OF BETTY, DADDY OF MICHAEL, ANNE AND GEOFFREY. "JESU, MERCY!"*

2336883 Signalman CHARLES **QUEENBOROUGH**, No. 1 Special Wireless Section.

- Died on 15 January 1945 in No. 83 (British) General Hospital at Cesena as a result of injuries sustained in an attempt to take his own life.
- Originally buried at Cesena Temporary Military Cemetery, his remains were reinterred on 9 April 1945 at Cesena War Cemetery, Italy. *SUNSHINE PASSES SHADOWS FALL BEAUTIFUL MEMORIES OUTLIVE ALL*

EC/10780 Lieutenant ARTHUR GEORGE **QUICK**, Unit Not Known—a unit of the Indian Signal Corps.

- Returning to India after a period of leave, he was killed in an air crash on 22 November 1945 after the war when Consolidated Liberator, serial KH126, of No. 53 Squadron, Royal Air Force crashed near R.A.F. Merryfield, Somerset shortly after take-off bound for India. Eighteen Royal Signals soldiers, four officers of various regiments, including Lieutenant Quick, and five aircrew were lost.

14588596 Driver THOMAS HARRY **QUIGGEN**, 15th (Scottish) Divisional Signals.

- Died on 19 May 1945 just after the war in Europe as a result of injuries sustained in an accident.
- Heverlee War Cemetery, Belgium.

2321791 Serjeant HARRY **QUILTER**, 4th (Tank) Battalion Coldstream Guards Signal Section.

- Killed in action** on 31 March 1945 by shellfire at Appelhulsen, Germany while the battalion was forming up to move off on its advance to Albachten and Münster during the North-West European Campaign. He was described in the battalion's war diary as *'one very valuable member of the Bn'*.
- Originally buried at Buldern, his remains were reinterred on 29 May 1947 at Reichswald Forest War Cemetery, Germany.

2370512 Signalman ANTHONY **QUINN**, No. 2 Company, No. 3 Command Signals.

- Died on 27 May 1942 in Tidworth Military Hospital as a result of a fractured skull sustained in a motorcycle accident.

2370202 Signalman REGINALD ROBERT **QUINN**, 'V' Force Signals.

- Died of blackwater fever on 23 May 1943 during the Burma Campaign.
- Originally buried in Chittagong Civil Cemetery Military Extension, his remains were reinterred on 3 February 1946 at Chittagong War Cemetery, Bangladesh. *"THY WILL BE DONE"*
- Commonwealth War Graves Commission: Yes

7006083 Signalmán JOHN **QUIREY**, 12th Anti-Aircraft Divisional Signals.

-Died of disease/natural causes on 15 February 1941 at Holywood Military Hospital, Northern Ireland.

-Belfast City Cemetery, Glenalina Extension. *GREATER LOVE HATH NO MAN*

¹ Commemorated as Indian Signal Corps. A pre-war soldier in the Royal Horse Guards (The Blues) and later employed by the General Post Office, he enlisted into Royal Signals on the outbreak of war and served in France with the British Expeditionary Force. Lance Corporal A. G. Quick was commissioned into the Indian Army on 8 July 1943 and served in the Burma Campaign.
